





• WT Membership Tier (based on economic factors) (As of Dec 2019)





Created in 2016, Taekwondo Cares is WT's development program to promote Taekwondo at the grassroots level in the MNAs, and also use Taekwondo as a means for social development with priority given to social minorities. It is in line with Corporate Social Responsibility.



## **Taekwondo Humanitarian Foundation**



#### Taekwondo Humanitarian Foundation

#### "EMPOWERING REFUGEES"

- There are currently nearly 26.4 million refugees worldwide, and 82.4 million people around the world have been forced to flee their homes.
- Many refugees are in poor physical, mental health. Refugees in many camps often have little to do. And half of global refugees are children.
- The Taekwondo Humanitarian Foundation, or THF, was designed to be part of the solution to this grave global crisis. It is the brainchild of World Taekwondo, or WT. The two organizations share the same president, Dr. Chungwon Choue; the WT supports the THF in some of its operations; and the two organizations share office space in Lausanne, Switzerland.
- However, the THF is not part of the WT. It is a charitable foundation established under Swiss law in April 2016. The two bodies, the THF and WT, are financially and organizationally independent.
- The THF was officially announced to the world in a speech to the UN Headquarters in New York by Dr. Choue on Sept. 21, 2015.
- The THF is now an official partner of the Olympic Refuge Foundation and receives a certificate of commendation from the Korean Minister of Culture, Sport and Tourism

### Taekwondo Humanitarian Foundation

#### **Humanitarian Taekwondo Center**

Location: Azraq refugee camp, Azraq, Jordan

Active since: April 2016

Number of students: 100

Partners: World Taekwondo Cares Program

The camp was created in 2014 by UNCR in conjunction with the Jordanian government to accommodate victims of the Syrian civil war. It currently hosts more than 32'000 Syrian refugees and stretching for more than 15 kilometers, it is one of the biggest refugee camps in Jordan.

At THF's Humanitarian Taekwondo Center, refugee children get the chance to learn sports key values, such as teamwork, fair-play, respect, cooperation, integrity and tolerance, and develop better physical and mental well-being. Aside from proper taekwondo training, they take part in different activities such as meditation, demonstrations, promotion tests, competitions and endurance races.





#### Taekwondo Humanitarian Foundation

#### Mahama and Kiziba Taekwondo Academies

- Location: Mahama refugee, Kirehe district, Eastern Rwanda and Kiziba refugee camp, Karongi district, Western Rwanda
- Active since: April 2017
- Number of students: apx. 250
- Partners: Rwanda Taekwondo Federation

Kiziba refugee camp was established in 1996 and hosts more than 17'000 refugees, primarily from the eastern part of the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). Mahama refugee camp hosts 52'020 refugees mostly from Burundi.

Taekwondo is an extremely popular sport in the refugee's camps and provides to 250 childre n with an ideal way to climb the socio-economic ladder. Aimed at young refugees, the project promotes the inclusion of para refugees through the shared practice of taekwondo, with the aim of fighting inequalities and improve the inclusion of all communities in the refugee's camps.

In 2014, the Turkish Taekwondo Federation began to operate a taekwondo academy in Kilis refugee camp. Since 2017, THF has partnered with the Turkish Federation to develop the Academy's scope of activities and capacity, and to secure training equipment.

In 2019, Kilis camp was closed by Turkish government therefore the project has shifted to Elbeyli refugee camp.

Currently, there are more than 2'000 Syrian refugee children attending taekwondo classes in Elbeyli camp, offered up to 12 times a week. The project's overall goals are to use taekwond o as a tool to help Syrian refugees to live alongside with Turkish citizens by practicing a sport that will promote integration and improve their life skills.

- WT is a full member of IPC since 2015








# Para Taekwondo Poomsae

- There are several Sport Classes for each impairment type with different levels of impairment
- The Para Taekwondo Poomsae Competition Rules are currently under review to be passed by the WT General Assembly in November 2021.
- WT hopes to resume competitions in Para Taekwondo Poomsae during 2022





#### **Athlete Classification**

- Classification is the cornerstone for Para Sport. It determines which athletes are eligible to compete in a sport and how athletes are grouped together for competition based on the degree of activity limitation.
- WT as a member of IPC needs to be compliant with the IPC Classification Code which adds a lot of procedures to Para Taekwondo that are usually not experienced in the Taekwondo world.
- An athlete can have an impairment and still not meet the criteria for competition in Para Taekwondo





- In May 2021, as part of our WT's Governance Improvement Initiative, WT adopted a
  restatement of the Statues.
- This included changes to the Council and other key structures that are intended to enhance Participation, Transparency, and Compliance. (Note how Participation was enhanced via expanded geographic representation and priority on greater gender balance.)
- The new Statutes also clarified the **key role the Council** plays an intermediary between **Management** and **General Assembly** (Member Associations).

- Understand your duty to use due care and diligence in fulfilling your functions as a Council member
- Be independent in judgment and actions and to take all reasonable steps to be satisfied as to the soundness of all decisions taken;
- Recognize that your primary responsibility is to the organization as a whole but, where appropriate, have regard to the interests of all stakeholders in the organization

#### Some rules of thumb:

- Do not make improper use of information that is acquired as a board member;
- Do not take advantage of your position for personal gain;
- Do not allow personal interests to conflict with the interest of the organization;
- Do not engage in conduct likely to bring discredit to the organization;
- Comply with both the letter as well as the spirit of the rules.

## Overview

- Enacted on May 13, 2019 as part of World Taekwondo's efforts for good governance
- The Rules apply to all WT Officials, namely but not limited to, elected and appointed officials of the Council, Commissions and Committees(hereinafter 'Committees'), Technical Officials (Technical Delegates, Competition Supervisory Board members, International Referees), WT advisors and the Officials of Para Taekwondo.

## **Guidelines for Council**

- Official Council Meetings, General Assemblies (Onsite)
  - Roundtrip, business class airfares for Vice Presidents, Treasurer, IOC Members
    - For official meetings on behalf of World Taekwondo, economy class airfare will be covered – upgradable if more than 8 hours flight time
  - Roundtrip, economy class airfares for Members. Eligible to upgrade to business class if scheduled flight time per leg is more than 8 hours
  - Accommodation covers arrival day, official meeting days, and departure day
  - Per diem of USD 250 covers only official meeting days

- Extraordinary Council Meetings, Virtual Meetings
  - No travel support provided
  - Accommodation support only for onsite Extraordinary Council Meeting during Grand Prix Finals
  - No per diem provided



## 6.1 Council Meetings

## **Ordinary Council Meeting**

- Called by President before an Ordinary General Assembly ("OGA")
- Normally one day before the GA
- Once per year

## **Extraordinary Council Meeting**

- Called by President before an Extraordinary General Assembly ("EGA") or whenever the President deems necessary.
- Frequency: Average 2 or 3 times per year

## **Ordinary General Assembly**

 Held every year at the location of World Taekwondo Championships and World Taekwondo Junior Championships

## **Extraordinary General Assembly**

Called by President or by 1/3 of the Council members or by 1/3 of the Level I Members

## 6.2 Rules of the Meetings

## **Before the Meeting**

- General Assembly Calling Notice is sent at least two (2) months (1 month for EGA) before the meeting.
- Council Members are requested to confirm attendance and register via GMS.
- General Assembly Agenda and Documents together with the invitation link for virtual meeting are sent at least one (1) month (2 weeks for EGA and Council Meeting) before the meeting.

## **After the Meeting**

- Minutes of the meetings are distributed to each member by no later than two (2) months after the meeting.
- Members are given opportunities to review the minutes and give feedbacks.
- If there are no comments, the minutes will be approved by the Council at the next meeting.

#### 1. Establish Quorum: Call Meeting to Order

 The meeting was called to order by the CHAIR of the Meeting, Dr. Chungwon Choue, WT President

The CHAIR welcomed Council Members for joining the third Council meeting of 2021. He invited Mr. Jeongkang Seo, Senior Director of Member Relations and Development department to manage roll call as an exercise for the General Assembly in October.

(Roll Call was completed)

- 2 Mr. Hoss Rafaty, Secretary General, announced that twenty-eight (28) Council Members and two (2) Auditors were present, thereby establishing a quorum in accordance with Article 8.6 of the WT Statutes. He mentioned that the video conference will be recorded
- 3. The CHAIR noted that the following members are absent with prior notice:
- Mr. Kamaladdin Hevdarov. Vice President
- Mr. Athanasios Pragalos, Vice President (Mr. Antonio Barbarino is present at the meeting on behalf of Mr. Pragalos)
- Mr. Kook Hyung Jung, Council Member

#### 2. President Report

- The CHAIR remarked that this is the most likely the last Council meeting before the Olympic and Paralympic Games in Tokyo.
- a He informed that the IOC has announced the Refugee Olympic Team for the Tokyo Olympic Games, and Taekwondo has three refugee athletes, making WT the third-most represented sport. He hopes that Taekwondo will be the first Olympic sport with a refugee athlete standing on the victory podium. He also informed that 130 athletes from 61 countries and the Refugee Olympic Team will compete for the glory.
- a. He addressed that Para Taekwondo will make its debut at the Paralympic Games this September with 72 athletes from 37 countries. He added that WT will also most likely have one refugee athlete for the Refugee Paralympic Team.
- 10. He added that the IOC informed all IFs a week ago that the initial sport programme for the Los Angeles 2028 Games will be decided at the IOC Session in Beijing next February, when the IOC convenes for the Winter Olympics in China.
- 11. He stated that WT is confident that Taekwondo will stay in the sports programme for 2028, as Taekwondo is one of the fairest and most transparent sports in the Olympic programme thanks to innovative technology like PSS and instant video replay. He added that over the years, WT has also contributed a lot to social and humanitarian development through sport, together with the IOC, the Olympic Refuge Foundation, and other IFs, and this coincides with the objectives of the Olympic Movement. He highlighted that the mission is to make the best objective judgment and eliminate human error. He stressed that the athletes have waited an extra year for this opportunity to compete again.
- 12 He then talked about the Statute alignment process with CUs. He said that it has caused some uneasiness with the CUs, but this is the way it has to be as part of World Taekwondo. He stressed that WT has to demonstrate to the IOC and ASOIF that good governance is not

## 6.2 Rules of the Meetings

## **During the Meeting**

- Secretary General does Roll-Call and confirms the quorum.
- Chairperson (President) opens the meeting followed by his report.
- For every agenda item, the Chairperson will introduce the item and open floor for any discussions or questions.

- A Council Member should state his/her name before speaking for the record.

## 6.3 Voting

### Voting

- Council Members excluding the Auditor are entitled to vote.
- Resolutions and other decisions are passed by a simple majority of eligible voters present in the meeting.
- Abstentions and blank or spoiled votes are counted for quorum but are not taken into consideration in the calculation of the required majority.
- The Chair shall not vote except in the case of a tie.

## **E-Voting**

- In the case of urgency, a resolution is submitted to a vote by electronic mail.
- Ballots returned that are abstentions or invalid votes are counted for quorum but are not taken into consideration in the calculation of the required majority. A simple majority of valid ballots decides.
